## JUST RURAL TRANSITION

Since its launch at the United Nations Climate Action Summit in September 2019, the Just Rural Transition (JRT) initiative continues to grow and evolve. This newsletter marks the establishment of the JRT Secretariat based at Meridian Institute, with thanks to the support of the UK's Department for International Development.



#### Introduction by Melissa Pinfield, Executive Director of the JRT Secretariat

I'm delighted and honoured to be working with Meridian colleagues to support the Just Rural Transition. A huge thank you to all those who participated in the recent webinar where we outlined some of the emerging action areas that the JRT will support. It was great to hear from so many people within the JRT network on potential collaboration opportunities. As the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic plays out through our economies and societies - with devastating consequences for many vulnerable communities - the need for effective, pragmatic and coordinated action to strengthen the resilience of food and land use systems and support food producers has never felt more pertinent.

In the coming weeks and months, we will be seeking your views and input to emerging priority work areas through webinars and bilateral consultations. We will also be creating a new JRT website and providing (virtual) opportunities for the diverse JRT community to interact with each another. The role of the Secretariat is to support <u>you</u> – the JRT community - to build collective knowledge and understanding and find common ground to collaborate and accelerate action in specific geographies or sectoral issues. # Policy Action Coalition (PAC) Repurposing and Reinvesting Government Support for Food and Agriculture



The PAC will continue to be supported by Ann Tutwiler as well as the JRT Secretariat based at Meridian. Through the PAC, participating governments, knowledge and implementation partners are working together to support the redirecting of public support (agricultural subsidies and price supports) and policies to the food and agricultural sector to support the development of resilient, sustainable food systems that meet twenty-first century challenges. The PAC will build a peer-to-peer learning platform and develop policy briefs, case studies and toolkits to support stakeholders move forward with policy reform and implementation. It will convene multi-stakeholder dialogues in partner countries and build momentum for reform at the global level.

Since its launch in September 2019, the PAC has expanded its membership and formed strong relationships with other interested parties in the broader agricultural community. This includes close coordination with the World Bank, whose Technical Assistance programme to Realign Agricultural Policies and Support for Sustainable Food Systems will support selected countries. Malawi and the World Farmers' Organisation both joined the

Coordinator, reflected that "it was great to see countries as diverse as Brazil and Togo sharing lessons learned with each other. The meeting really illustrated to me the value and importance of peer to peer learning opportunities. The priority in the coming weeks is to consult PAC partners and think through medium to long term impacts of COVID-19 on the food and agricultural sector and implications for the PAC's work in supporting countries who want to repurpose their government support to the sector."

A key priority for PAC Coordinator, Ann Tutwiler, supported by the JRT Secretariat based at Meridian, is to consult PAC partners and think through implications of COVID-19 on this work.

### Investment Partnerships Network (IPN) Scaling Finance for the Just Rural Transition

The IPN - led by World Business Council for Sustainable Development (WBCSD) – will work with interested food, agribusiness and finance sector companies to accelerate and scale investments that contribute to transformation of landscapes and agricultural supply chains in line with the JRT objectives. This includes developing and aligning investment criteria, facilitating new investment partnerships and scaling proven models – such as the Sustainable Rice Landscapes Initiative.

The IPN is currently undertaking a landscape analysis to identify key stakeholders from WBCSD's membership and the broader finance community, clarify roles and processes and assess relevant COVID-19 implications. ### **Community News**

The Climate Investment Funds recently launched their <u>Just Transition Initiative</u> (JTI), a new partnership with the Center for Strategic and International Studies (CSIS). The Initiative will develop an interactive learning platform of resources, guidance, policy recommendations and strategies informed by consultations, literature review and case study analysis.

The case study analysis will draw on the CIF's unique experience as a multi-MDB climate fund that has been deploying US\$8.1 billion across 300 projects in 72 developing countries. The initiative will also develop a comprehensive framework to assess and define just transitions that can assist CIF and partners to identify investments and technical assistance in support of just transition strategies.

The first phase of the JTI will focus on the energy transition but the learning platform and framework will incorporate multi-sectoral implications of the low-carbon and climate-resilient transition, including those related to the rural economy. There is great potential for the JRT community to contribute to and benefit from this aligned initiative.

### **Upcoming Events and Opportunities**

Later this month the JRT Secretariat will be hosting a webinar with the Rights and Resources Initiative to explore how knowledge and learning around efforts to secure land rights and land tenure can be integrated into the JRT's efforts focused on policy reform and investment criteria. Invites to the JRT network will shortly be sent out.

In addition to utilizing remote opportunities for connecting, the JRT Secretariat and partners will be looking for, and welcome suggestions on other ways to work effectively together through this difficult period.
